Jesus Prays for You
Often when I write a sermon,
there is more material or
interesting ideas than can really
fit. About halfway through
preaching on Sunday I was
thinking back to the advice of my

preaching professors. One of the things they often emphasized was having one main point in our sermons. This hit me while preaching on Sunday as I realized my sermon had far more than one point. So, it is probably best I left some things out.

I mentioned in the sermon an article on prayer written by one of my seminary professors, Kristen Deede Johnson. In the article Johnson discusses those times when we feel far from God and prayer seems ineffective. She talks about realizing that her relationship with God is not dependent upon prayer, but upon the work of Jesus Christ. Johnson then

goes on to quote James B. Torrance's great book, *Worship, Community, and the Triune God of Grace.* Torrance writes.

The God to whom we pray and with whom we commune knows we want to pray, try to pray, but cannot pray. So God comes to us as a man in Jesus Christ to stand in for us, pray for us, teach us to pray and lead our prayers. God in grace gives us what he seeks from us—a life of prayer—in giving us Jesus Christ and the Spirit. So Christ is very God, the God to whom we pray. And he is very man, the man who prays for us and with us.

Dwell for a moment on the truth that Jesus prays for you. He is praying for you even when you don't know what to pray or how to pray. The God who knows you completely is also a man who prays for you. In addition, we are told in Romans 8 that the Holy Spirit intercedes for us as well! Even when we struggle to pray the Son and the Spirit are talking to God the Father on our behalf. Of course, this is not a reason to stop praying. In fact, I think it is precisely the opposite. If you knew someone was praying for you every single day, wouldn't you want to spend time with them? Wouldn't you want to get to know them and spend some time praying with them? I hope so. Take some time today to join in the conversation of the triune God and join your prayers with the prayers of the Son and Spirit.

Jonathan's House - C.A.R

Luke 14: ¹² Then Jesus said to his host, "When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or sisters, your relatives, or your rich neighbors; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid. ¹³ But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, ¹⁴ and you will be blessed. Although they cannot repay you, you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

Central African Republic is the 2nd worst country on earth to live in (2020 Legatum Prosperity Index,

where 59% of the population is undernourished, 47% of children under five years of age have stunted growth, and 12% of children won't live to age five (2019 Global Hunger Index).

The school lunch program at Jonathan's House Central African Republic feeds approximately 425 children daily. Because our Christian School accepts orphans without requiring school fees, many of our students are orphans. You'll never see these children as they eat their only nutritious meal of the day. You'll never hear about the incredible hardships they have faced in their young lives or



their many other needs that still aren't being met. I have been there, and I've seen the difference in the health and happiness of

these children who just happened to be born in the middle of the hungriest country on earth. For these 425 children, a nutritious lunch every day makes a world of difference.

Your friends, brothers, sisters, relatives, and rich neighbors aren't invited to eat at the school lunch program. However, the poor, the crippled, and lame, and the blind will be there. Our church is a generous supporter of the school lunch program, and if you believe that the Bible is the inspired word of God and you have read Luke 14:12 – 14, you can be thankful that these children won't be able to repay you. They don't know your names and they won't even have the opportunity to say thank you. However, I want you to know these children are deeply thankful for you. As far as meeting them, perhaps that will be arranged in the presence of our Lord and Savior in the place where there is no hunger.

Appreciating your pastor

If a church wants a "better" pastor, it needs to be praying for the one it has. Pray often and caringly for your pastors, church leaders and their families. The role is challenging, so support them spiritually and ask God to reveal his love and grace to these special servants.

Daily reminders of baptism



One way Satan attacks
Christians is by reminding us of
our sins, both of commission
(wrongdoing) and omission
(neglecting to do right). And
one way we can fight back is

by remembering our baptism. The reformer Martin Luther recommended pondering that sacrament daily, whenever we wash our face, because "in baptism sins are drowned."

Getting dressed can serve as another frequent reminder, Luther says, because baptism is the "daily garment ... the Christian is to wear all the time." He writes, "Christ instituted holy baptism ... to clothe you with his righteousness. It is tantamount to his saying, 'My righteousness shall be your righteousness; my innocence, your innocence. Your sins indeed are great, but by baptism I bestow on you my righteousness; I strip death from you and clothe you with my life."

Lessons from lilies

Recently I was challenged to think about what consumes me — and what distracts me from giving God more. In Matthew 6:25-34, Jesus tells us not to worry about what we eat, drink and wear. I've read those verses numerous times and usually respond, "Yeah, but the birds and lilies don't have mortgages and bills! How can I not worry?" I'm finally realizing that if I put Christ first, then my trust in him affects my day-to-day decisions. Plus, negative thoughts start to fade.

When do you respond, "Yeah, but ..." to God? Maybe it's when you want to sleep in on Sunday, or when the offering plate is passed, or when you're asked to teach Sunday school. Try reciting Matthew

Going to extremes

When a herd of elephants ventured into a town in eastern India, people chased them away. But soon they learned that a baby elephant had fallen into a 30-foot well and been left behind. Workers had to use three backhoes to free the calf, breaking down the brick well and digging a sloping trench for the youngster to walk out on.

Righting a wrong — and even saving a life — may require extreme measures. A structure holding someone captive may need to be torn down. And in many cases, it's better to allow the trapped one as much independence and agency as possible.

Rather than hoisting the elephant out vertically, which might have been dangerous and traumatic, helpers made a path so it could take part in attaining its freedom.

God often works like this, restoring and equipping us to partner with him. How can we

assist others while granting them the dignity of being part of the solution?




October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

SEPTEMBER SESSION ACTIONS



The Stated Session meeting of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown met in Fellowship Hall, September 21, 2021. Moderator Rev. Bryan Kunz opened the Session meeting at 7:01 p.m. Tedra Henze presented the devotions and prayer.

There was a quorum in attendance.

Motion prevailed to approve the August 17, 2021, Session minutes.

Search Team report: Pastor Bryan reported the committee has met twice and has clarified the role and job description for the Director of Youth Discipleship and Outreach. It has been posted to the internet. Committee members are: Allison Grosvenor, Mary Hemming, Bryan Kunz (co-chair), Bruce Wirin, and Amber Young (co-chair).

The pastor's report was presented.

Finances: Matt Broshar presented the financials and noted contributions continue to be strong with giving this August topping the two previous Augusts. There was discussion of compensation especially in the area of music which will be addressed in the upcoming budget. Some of the money in insurance proceeds fund is earmarked for the NE door project. Matt is working on the special gifts fund to be sure committees know if money has been set aside for things within their purview.

Finance/Stewardship: The committee has not met.

Mission/Evangelism: Amy Drummer reported the **committee motion to approve** forwarding grant requests from Jonathan's House and MorningStar Missions to presbytery. **Motion carried**.

Worship & Music: Pastor Bryan reported 93 for communion in September. There was discussion about rebuilding teams for music, ushering, etc.

Christian Ed: Angie Pietig reported the committee is focused on Sunday school and have three rotations with the fourth one being breakfast. Kickoff events went well. Youth will go to Lake View Camp in Pella September 26th.

A & P: Terry Buzbee reported the motion from committee to approve the Director of Youth Discipleship and Outreach salary range of \$37,000 \$45,000 with single health benefit. Motion passed. The joint budget committee will start meeting soon. It consists of the chairs of A&P (Terry Buzbee), Property (Pat Hemming), Stewardship (Ron Kauffman), and Deacons (Paul Podhajsky) with the bookkeeper (Matt Broshar) being an ex-officio

member. Nominating committee will begin its work soon, and the number of elders and deacons was brought up. This will be an ongoing discussion.

Membership & Involvement: Dave Freel reported there will be a church float in the Oktemberfest parade. They are looking for youth to hand out candy. There will be breakfasts after church on the second Sunday of the month.

Property: Pat Hemming reported the tuckpointing to repair derecho damage to the roof was completed this week. Gas lines have been rewrapped to meet company requirements. Pat is also working on fixing a light fixture in the kitchen that is falling. There was discussion about use of the Gathering Place. The committee is looking at guidelines for what donations the church should accept.

Other: none

Angie Pietig will present the devotions for the October 2021 Session meeting.

Motion prevailed to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was closed at 8:35 p.m. with prayer by Rev. Bryan Kunz.


