**A Letter from Missionaries,
 Dan & Elizabeth Turk**

Dear Friends,

Greetings from Orlando! While feeling a bit unsettled being away from our work and home in Madagascar, we are grateful that everyone in our family is healthy. We give thanks to God for this and the blessing of being together as a family since April. Son Robert recently returned to Chicago to continue his *Masters in Art* therapy and counseling.

Daughter Frances will soon begin her teaching internship in Orlando. PC(USA) enacted a travel ban for all staff 2020, so we will be in the U.S. until then. This has taken some adjusting to – but changing plans seem to be the norm this year!

COVID-19 in Madagascar

Madagascar experienced a huge upsurge in COVID-19 cases beginning in late June. The health system is overburdened with the influx of COVID-19 patients. Testing is not keeping up with the spread of the disease. The economic consequences of the crisis are extreme, especially for people with low income who depend on today's wages for tonight's supper. A shop owner told us that people are now buying essentials in very small quantities, like half a cup of rice or 7 cents of cooking oil at a time. There will undoubtedly be far more COVID-19 related deaths from hunger than from the actual disease. National parks and many of Madagascar's endangered animals and plants are also suffering greatly due to the absence of tourism and increased cutting of native trees for firewood.

FJKM and COVID-19

PC(USA)'s partner church in Madagascar, the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar (FJKM), is contending with the COVID-19 crisis. Student pastors, pastors, and FJKM staff have had COVID-19, and some have died. The government canceled in-person worship services for 5 Sundays in March-April and then again starting in mid-June. This has resulted in a huge drop in the FJKM's revenue. Unfortunately, many FJKM employees have been put on half salary, including central office staff, personnel in FJKM's five seminaries, and the 72 FJKM evangelists.

We are grateful for modern technology that enables us to stay connected with friends and colleagues in Madagascar. Despite modifications due to COVID restrictions, FJKM's ministries continue. Here's a bit of what has been happening:

FJKM's COVID-19 Response

FJKM's radio is broadcasting worship services, and the FJKM president has been participating in televised worship services. Several FJKM branches, including the AIDS Committee, are producing and distributing masks. FJKM's Development Department created COVID-19 flyers and training materials and equipped its 30 dispensaries with protective and cleaning supplies. Grants from PC(USA) funded many of these activities.

AIDS Training for Seminary Students

The seminar for FJKM Ivato seminary students scheduled for March was delayed due to COVID-19. When restrictions eased in June, the training was held with modifications. Instead of everyone going away to a retreat center, the training was held at the seminary. Students received hand sanitizer, sat socially distant in a large training room, wore masks, and returned to their homes for meals. The AIDS committee gave gifts of rice, oil, and soap to students from funds that would have been used for meals. They also made masks to distribute to students. The July trainings for other seminaries were delayed due to renewed restrictions.

Fruits, Vegetables, and Environmental Education Program

The work of FJKM's Fruits, Vegetables, and Environmental Education (FVEE) program continues, especially activities at the fruit center at Mahatsinjo and the Ivato tree nursery. In early July, my colleagues traveled to the fruit center, where they did an inventory of the mangos planted in 2020. There are now 311 mango trees belonging to 57 varieties planted in the ground (187 planted in 2020). In addition, there are 27 other varieties planted in 20-liter pots where they are being propagated. All told, the FVEE now has 92 varieties, including 64 brought from Florida. Plans have been developed to expand the training of farmers and volunteer technicians that started in November 2019 with funding from the Presbyterian Hunger Program. In 2019, 17 volunteer technicians, 84 farmers, and five synod representatives received training in how to grow and propagate mangos and other fruit trees.

In response to COVID-19, the FVEE program is intensifying a cash-for-work effort to help low-income farmers get some income during this difficult time. Farmers will help with weeding and mulching at the fruit center and the Ranomafana Arboretum. They will receive vegetable seeds, soap, and education about growing vegetables and how to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Prayer Requests

- That the FJKM church will find safe and relevant ways to minister in this difficult time.
- For Madagascar's health system, as it deals with the rising number of COVID-19 cases.
- For recovery from COVID-19 for colleagues who have the virus and protection for those who do not have it.

- For us, as we balance living with our hearts in two worlds and protection from COVID-19 for our family.
- For our nation as it wrestles with how to deal with COVID-19 and the need for racial justice.

While we cannot speak in-person right now, we are open to other ways of sharing, like Zoom, Skype, and videos. Another great opportunity to stay connected to Madagascar is by joining the Madagascar Mission Network and attending the MMN meeting, which will be held virtually this November 12th -14th. Thank you very much for your support and prayers—they help us continue our work with the FJKM and encourage our FJKM brothers and sisters in Christ in these difficult days.

And in Galatians 5:6 (NRSV), St. Paul writes, "For in Christ Jesus ... the only thing that counts is faith working through love." Amid all the worthy pursuits that fill your days, remember to choose rightly — by choosing love.

Just Be—and Be Still

Various versions of the following sentiment are posted online: "I am a human being, not a human doing. It's okay to just be sometimes." Many of us get anxious if we think we're not doing enough, but peace activist Thich Nhat Hanh insists it's not a waste of time to just be: "To be alive, to be peaceful, to be joyful, to be loving ... is what the world needs most."

During the pandemic, when people were urged to stay home to slow the virus' spread, we had to think hard about how to continue being the church while limited in what we could go out and "do." Yet church leaders reminded us that we were actually loving our neighbors by staying home — by being less active.

It's sometimes okay — ideal, even — to just be. In quieting our bodies, minds and hearts, we may find ourselves more often in prayer, more aware of God's presence and more nourished for when the time is right to again take up more active forms of ministry, peacemaking and love. "In quietness and trust is your strength" (Isaiah 30:15, NIV).

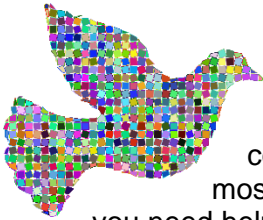

Words from Rev. Tom Bower

You've heard it said many times, "We're in this together!" That's usually said referring to the pandemic, calling attention to the changes we're going through and the issues we have to face. And it's so true: We are in this together as dwellers on this globe (earth), as citizens of the United States, as Iowans, and as Marshall County residents. And we certainly would like to think that being "together" means we can solve our problems, meet our challenges without rancor and squabbling.

But that doesn't seem to be happening in our society. Someone said to me, "Why do we have to politicize everything?" Good question. Can't we express our views and opinions without belittling those who don't agree with us? Can't we be part of obtaining solutions without thinking everything has to go our way?

So in our current circumstances, we get confused about things like how to best do school, who and how people should be tested for the virus, whether or not restaurants and bars should be open, whether or not everyone should wear a mask, will we be vaccinated if and when a vaccine becomes available, how long should we self-quarantine? On and on.

God spoke through His prophet Isaiah "Come now, let us reason together..." (Isaiah 1: 18). This statement is a common title for books, podcasts, and websites. Apparently, God intends that we are able to solve our problems without rancor and squabbling. It is a verse in the Bible which is full of grace and mercy. It was spoken directly to God's people rather than to a crowd of skeptics.

Oh, how we wish our secular society would listen the words from Isaiah and commit to reasoning together.

SEPTEMBER SESSION ACTIONS

The Stated Session meeting of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown, met via Zoom, September 15, 2020.

Moderator Rev. Tom Bower opened the Session meeting at 7:02 p.m. with prayer. Case Hegeman presented the devotions and prayer.

There was a quorum in attendance.

Motion prevailed to approve the August 18, 2020 Stated Session minutes as printed.

Staff reports were presented.

Finances: Matt Broshar presented the financials. August giving was the second highest giving month this year due to an \$8,000 donation. Many people are writing checks monthly rather than weekly. We

need to continue to encourage people to give. Expenditures are down so we have a good cash flow.

Finance/Stewardship: No finance report. Pastor Tom Bower, Ron Kauffman and Matt Broshar will meet to discuss the 2021 Stewardship campaign.

Mission/Evangelism: Dave Freel reported the committee has submitted three Presbytery grants at \$1,500 for Wells. for Sudan, Jonathan's House lunch program in Central African Republic and MorningStar Missions in Honduras. The committee wants to get a group to help clean up things around the church grounds. Dave will keep in contact with Valerie King to see where the committee can help with the King family needs.

Worship & Music: No report.

Christian Ed: Doug Bacon reported that Sunday school continues on-line. Wednesday Club will be a grab-and-go program running from Oct. 7, - Dec. 16, from 4:30 – 5:30. Five third graders will receive Bibles this year at their homes. Two children have already got their Bibles at Wednesday Club last fall so Bible hi-lighters have been ordered for them. A video will be made of the kids getting their Bibles or hi-lighters and will be shown at a worship service later. The committee continues to work on a Christmas program for this year.

A & P: Richie Ritter reported and discussed reopening the church. The committee continues to monitor the COVID situation and practicing the rules adopted. He encouraged everyone to get their flu shot to slow down the flu situation that we could have this winter. Richie continues to monitor Pastor Rich's situation noting that Rich will be off from three to six months to recuperate. He meets with Pastor Tom and Jon Rottink and will work with Pastor Ian McMullen to discuss a long-term plan if it is needed.

Membership & Involvement: No report.

Property: Pat Hemming reported that they are still waiting for the parking lot to be resurfaced. He noted that Jim Brothers of Jim's Barber shop came to the office to say he was moving out of his space in the Gathering Place. He has found a space where the rent is half of what he's paying here. He will be completely out of his current space by November 1.

Church Reopening: Steve Anderson reported showing several graphs of active cases of coronavirus in Marshall County. Working with the recommendations coming from Harvard, the committee decided they could open if there are only 10 cases in the county for several weeks. If cases go up to 15 or more cases in Marshall County after the church is opened, the church will reclose again.

An article will be put in the church newsletter and on the church website regarding the church reopening. The group will continue to meet weekly on Wednesdays at 7 p.m. via Zoom until they are able to open the church safely.

Other: Purchasing a four-channel system to project the services in the Fellowship Hall was left on the table to be discussed at a future Session meeting.

Pastor Tom noted that the review of the church record books by Presbytery will not be done this year.

Motion prevailed to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was closed at 8:00 with prayer by Rev. Tom Bower.

Church Reopening

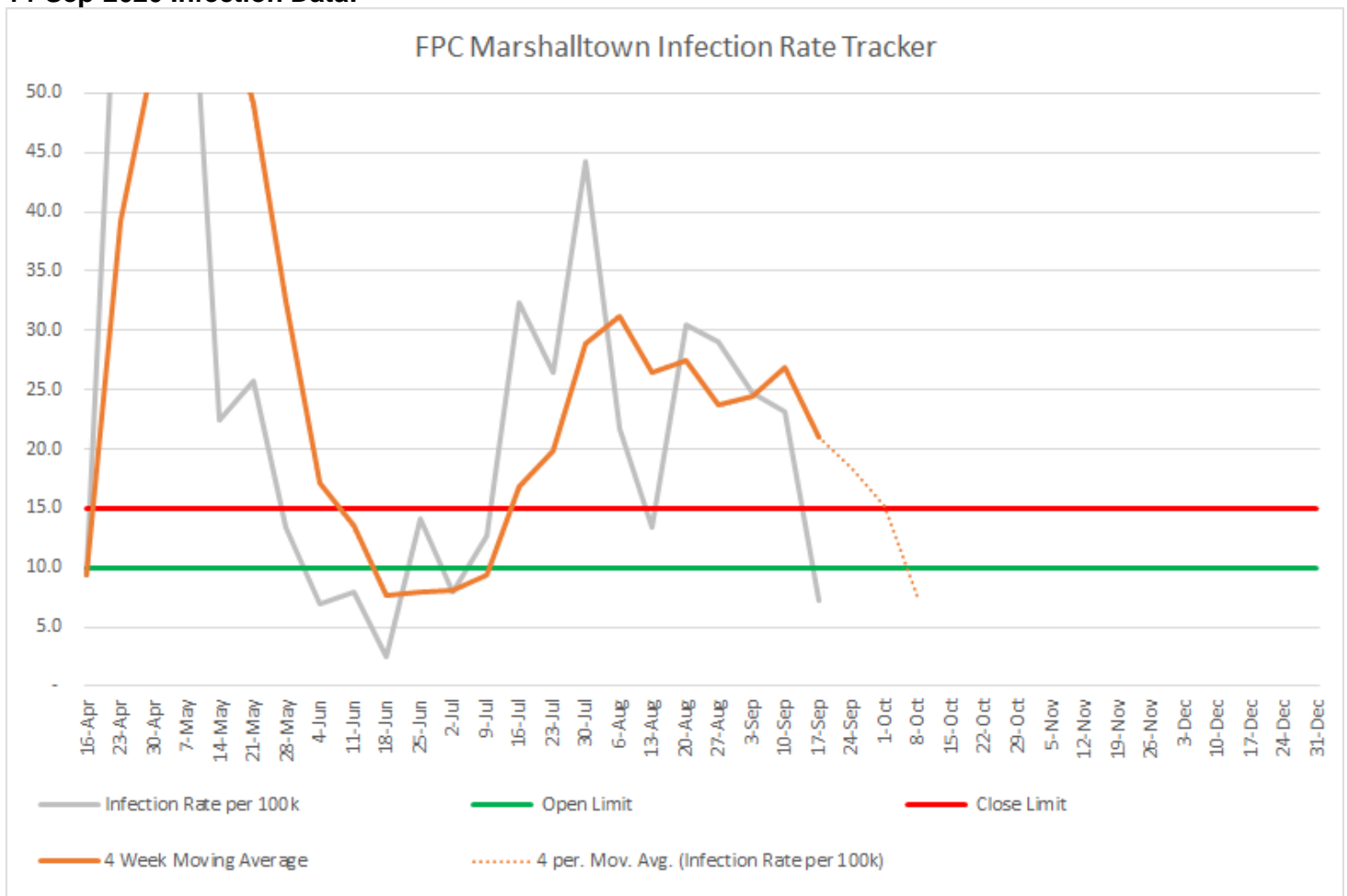
This document will be used to develop and review information to be shared on the FPC website. The goal of the website information is to provide the congregation with information on the considerations the committee is using for decisions to re-open the church.

First Presbyterian Church has a re-opening committee who is reviewing information and making preparations for reopening the church. This committee makes recommendations to Session on reopening the church and other activities. **The primary directive of the committee is the safety of everyone involved.**

Re-opening Criteria and Current Status

The decision to reopen the church will be based on the report of infection rates for Marshall County as reported in the [Times-Republican](#). The criteria for First Presbyterian Church are guided by the Key Metrics for COVID Suppression framework from the [Harvard Global Health Institute and Brown School of Public Health](#). Specifically, a recommendation for reopening will be made as a four-week running average of weekly infection falls below 10 cases per 100,000. A recommendation to close will be made if infection rates exceed 15 cases per 100,000.

These criteria plus other information will be considered in the reopen decision.

Reopening Procedures

Special procedures will be used as we reopen to reduce the probability of infection. These include:

- You will be asked to notify the church (procedures to be announced later) of intent to attend
- Members that have been in contact in the previous 14 days with someone who is sick are asked not to attend in person
- If you are showing any symptoms of the disease you are asked not to attend
- Only the South door will be opened
- Masks are required

- Social distancing is required
- Your name will be recorded to allow for contact tracing should someone in attendance fall ill
- The elevator will be operated using paper towels to reduce touch
- Sitting areas in pews have been designated to ensure social distancing
- Bathroom doors have been modified to allow opening and closing without touch
- There will not be singing
- You will be ushered out of the building as families after the service and allowed to socialize outdoors in the parking lot if you so desire--still observing mask and distancing rules
- Following the service, the areas of the church used for the service will be closed for 72 hours to allow the areas to dissipate any virus brought into the church
