New Pastor approved at Congregational Meeting on May 23, 2021



On May 23, 2021, the **Breaking** congregational meeting of First Presbyterian Church approved the call of Rev. Bryan Kunz to be our

next installed pastor. He will officially become our pastor July 1, but he and Pastor Tom Bower will be transitioning responsibilities throughout June. Pastor Tom's last Sunday in the pulpit will be June 27th.

On May 23rd, our pastor candidate Rev. Bryan Kunz, and his wife Larissa, joined us in worship. Bryan preached about "What is True Mustard Seed-like Faith" and

answered questions from the congregation after the service. A Congregational meeting of First Presbyterian Church was held in which the PNC moved to approve Bryan Kunz as our installed pastor. In a unanimous vote of 131 ballots, the congregation elected Bryan as our new Pastor. A reception was held in the Fellowship Hall following the vote, and people got to meet Bryan and Larissa while enjoying coffee, tea, and donuts.

So, who is Bryan Kunz? Bryan Kunz was born in Oskaloosa, Iowa. He met his wife Larissa at Christian summer camps where they both worked. They were later married in 2013 and have a son Declan (3) and a daughter Esme (1). Pastor Bryan was previously employed as associate pastor at Harlem Reformed Church in Holland, MI, Larissa grew up in Canada, and works as a Pediatric Emergency Room Nurse at Mercy One in Des Moines.

learn from all of these events. Yes, there have been struggles, inconveniences, even pain and grief. We recover and life moves on. And we want to move on as better people. We want to have grown from what has happened in our lives. Galatians 6: 9 comes to mind: "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

Second, we need to keep our focus. The coach tells his athletes, "Keep your eye on the ball." Sort out what is really important. For believers, the object of our focus is, of course, Jesus Christ. As Hebrews 12:2 puts it, "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith..." It's easy to be glib about that and think pastors have to say such things.

But it's just plain good psychology for Christian and non-Christian alike to focus when things seem to be scattered and complicated and almost out-of-control. And we believe our focus is Christ and we do ask in complex circumstances, what would Jesus do? We even ask what would Jesus think? Proverbs 3 says, "In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will direct your paths."

MAY SESSION ACTIONS



The Stated Session meeting of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown met in Fellowship Hall and via Zoom, May 18, 2021.

Moderator Rev. Tom Bower opened the Session meeting at 7:00 p.m. Pat Hemming presented the devotions and prayer.

There was a quorum in attendance.

Motion prevailed to approve the April 20, 2021, Session minutes.

PNC report: Terry Buzbee reported several members of the PNC were present for the Commission on Ministry (COM) meeting and they were pleased with how well the candidate did. The COM approved Rev. Bryan Kunz and the terms of his call. The next step is the congregation's approval on May 23rd. Terry and Pastor Tom walked Session through the congregational meeting process and conducted a test poll of the Zoom system to be sure it

would allow people attending the congregational meeting via Zoom to vote. There was also a discussion of the May 23rd reception and what new CDC guidelines meant for masks, donuts, and children. If the congregation approves the call of Rev. Kunz his target start date will be July 1. Pastor Tom is ready to help with a smooth transition.

Staff reports were presented.

Finances: Matt Broshar presented the financials noting we are still below the budget but are meeting expenses. April giving was weak and dropped below the previous year giving. Our fund balance is still strong, however, and May has started strong.

Finance/Stewardship: Ron Kauffman reported the committee has not met.

Mission/Evangelism: Case Hegeman reported the committee had Bill Wilson, who does ministry to the homeless in NYC, here May 10. They are also conducting a clothing drive with Orphan Grain Train in May.

Worship & Music: Wynona Anderson reported 71 people took communion on May 2nd. There was a link failure in the sanctuary lighting control box, but it has been fixed.

Christian Ed: Angie Pietig reported that graduates will be honored on May 30th. Sunday school teachers will be needed in the fall, and Sunday school may look a little different.

A & P: Terry Buzbee reported the committee met with Matt Broshar to get a better understanding of the roles of the financial secretary, bookkeeper, and treasurer. They are looking at budget guidelines and the possibility of reinstating a joint budget committee.

Membership & Involvement: No report

Property: Pat Hemming reported committee has decided to go with Heart of Iowa for phone and internet. The elevator sump pump has been working.

Church Reopening: Don Feld reported social distancing had been removed from the center section of the sanctuary but remains in place in other areas at this time.

Other: Pastor Tom reported Nancy is unsure whether she can return to work June 1.

Ashley Johnson will present the devotions for the June 2021 Session meeting.

Motion prevailed to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was closed at 7:57 p.m. with prayer by Rev. Tom Bower and the group repeated the "Lord's Prayer."


